NORTH YORK HISTORICAL SOCIETY ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING MINUTES February 19th, 2014 North York Central Library, Meeting Room #1

- **1. CALL TO ORDER:** The President, Bill Aird, called the meeting to order, and welcomed Members to the North York Historical Society's 54th Annual General Meeting. He noted that the Society has had a good year, with fundraising for plaquing being successful, and the Society's profile in the Community being raised numerous activities are listed in the recent Newsletter. We have raised over \$600.00 for the Miriam Jackson Fund, and, after consultation with the family, a suitable gift will be given to Gibson House in Miriam's memory. The President has been involved in Community Outreach, giving talks on the history of Willowdale to a number of groups. More of these events are being planned, including one at Barbara Frum Library next month.
- 2. **MINUTES of the 2013 AGM** were published in the November 2013-January 2014 Newsletter. These were approved by the membership. (Edith Geduld, Myrna Fox)
- **3. REPORTS**: Included in the Newsletter are reports from: The President, the North York Community Preservation Panel, and the following Committees: Archives, Heritage Resource Centre, Plaquing, Programs and Webmaster. These were approved by the Membership. (Edith Geduld, Betty McQuillan)
- 4. **TREASURER'S REPORT:** The Statement of Financial Position as at December 31, 2013, prepared by Edward Macdonell, was distributed to the Members. The Chair gave an explanation of some of the figures, noting that the Society is in a much better financial position in 2103 than in 2012, because we no longer need to pay for premises at the Miller. Revenue and Expenses are roughly even. The Statement is still to be audited, and if there are any changes, these will be brought back to the Membership next month. A motion to receive the report was approved by the membership. (Edith Geduld, Tony Wagner)
- **5. NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT:** The President handed the Chair to Geoff Geduld, Past President, Chair of the Nominating Committee. Other members are Linda Gargaro (Board) and Edith Geduld (Member at Large). The 2014 slate of Board Officers and Directors were listed on the Agenda: Past President, Geoff Geduld: President, Bill Aird: Vice President, Glenn Bonnetta: Treasurer, Edward Macdonell: Secretary, Ruth Kingma: Directors, (5) Linda Gargaro, Edith Geduld, Susan Goldenberg, 2 vacancies. The Chair called for nominations from the floor, and Maria Sabatino volunteered to be a Director, leaving 1 vacancy. Approved.
- **6. THE PRESIDENT** resumed the Chair. Edith Geduld gave a report on the membership of the Committees listed on the agenda, and appealed for volunteers. Bill Aird noted that we are now being charged for the use of Edithvale Community Centre for Board meetings, and Tony Wagner noted that O'Connor house may be able to be helpful in future. NORTH YORK'S URBAN HERITAGE HERO

Our congratulations to Mary Ann Cross, member of the North York Community Preservation Panel and a member of the North York Historical Society.

"If not for Mary Ann Cross many of North York's streets and parks would bear names of no significance whatsoever, such as flowers that never grew in the area. But thanks to Cross' tireless efforts, several now carry the names of community pioneers.

'Mary Ann Cross has assumed the role of champion for the naming of streets and parks in North York to remember, honour and celebrate the early settlers in North York, with the active support of the North York Community Preservation Panel', said panel chair, Geoff Kettel, who nominated her for an Urban Hero Award.

Cross has worked diligently to get families' consent for their ancestors' names to be honoured, Kettel said.

She is so far responsible for eight historical names being used for road signs including Johnson Farm Lane southwest of Finch Avenue and Yonge Street commemorating the area's once rural landscape and a number of streets in Downsview's Stanley Greene neighbourhood."

JOHNSON FARM LANE

Johnson Farm Lane commemorates the Johnson family who settled in Willow Dale in 1797, and donated land for a cemetery in 1834, part of which still remains at Yonge Street and Churchill Avenue, although the adjoining church on Jacob Cummer's land is long gone. Rather than Lawrence or Abraham Johnson, Johnson Farm was chosen to commemorate the farmland of early days, and the whole family rather than only the men.

Since there are so few vestiges of our rural, pioneering days left, it is important to commemorate early settlers by naming new streets after them.

Note: This street name was adopted by the North York Community Council on May 29, 2011, and was the last heritage name recommended by the North York Community Preservation Panel before the Honourific and Street Naming Policy was changed to require the consent of a descendent on November 29, 2011.

JOHN McKENZIE HOUSE

The John McKenzie House is a three-storey brick structure, lot 18, concession 1 East, north of Sheppard Avenue, east of Yonge Street. It was constructed in 1913 as the second Willowdale home of a pioneer family, on property deeded to Jacob Cummer in 1801. In 1884, a portion of the original property was sold to Philip McKenzie (John's father), who was an English immigrant trained as a carpenter and casket maker.

Philip and his wife, Sarah Thompson, of Whitchurch Township, first moved into the old Cummer farmhouse, a one and a one-half storey brick Georgian style dwelling. This house was built about 1840, between Parkview and Norton Avenue, facing west. When Philip McKenzie died, John ran the farm and specialized in Holstein cattle until the local economy for farmers began to deteriorate. John then decided to subdivide the farm, and in 1912, registered the "Empress Subdivision" that was to



become the heart of modern east Willowdale, as the area was transformed from a rural village to a suburban community.

In 1913, John and his wife, Eva, chose a large lot on the rise of land just east of Yonge Street on Parkview Avenue, as the site for their new home. From their farm, they retained the 1907 brick milk house, built a stable in 1915 and a coach house in 1918.

Built in a style which has been described as Queen Anne Revival, Arts and Crafts and Edwardian this red brick house contains 12 rooms and 3 bathrooms. The front of the house is profiled by a grand L-shaped, wrap-around verandah with stylized Doric columns. A large attached coach house was converted to accommodate automobiles and has a recreation room above. Significant interior features include a centre hall plan, a vestibule door and sidelights with bevelled leaded glass, a large leaded art glass window which lights the landing of the main staircase, two sunrooms, panelled doors and wainscoting, strip hardwood flooring and radiators.

Descendants of the McKenzie family lived in the house until the 1970s. By the 1980s it was in the hands of a developer, and the then City of North York (NY) planned to demolish the buildings for road construction. The Ontario Historical Society (OHS) lobbied to retain the buildings and NY agreed to relocate the proposed road. In 1993, the OHS proposed the restoration of the property, which resulted in a long term lease with NY. The OHS has restored all four buildings and the interior of the coach house has been renovated for adaptive use as a community program and exhibit area.

This property is owned by the City of Toronto (City) and leased to the OHS as its head office. 2013 marked both the 125th anniversary of the OHS and the 100th anniversary of the John McKenzie House.

The Ontario Heritage Trust (OHT) has a number of conservation tools available to protect and preserve heritage throughout the province. Conservation easements are voluntary legal agreements, between heritage property owners and the OHT, that protect significant features of a property.

In 2013 the OHT and the City completed an easement agreement to protect this provincially significant property, which is leased to the OHS as its head office. The easement will protect the impressive Edwardian classical-style house constructed in 1913, as well as the attached coach house (1918), milk house (1907), stable (1915), the McKenzie Parkette and community garden.

NORTH YORK COMMUNITY PRESERVATION PANEL REPORT

The panel is concerned that the City's new street naming policy requires consent of a descendent, thus making it very difficult to recommend pioneer names. The Official Plan's Heritage Policies (update) although approved by the City and Ontario Ministry is facing 49 appeals at the OMB in 2015.
